## **GENERAL STATEMENT OF DUTIES**

Develops audio and visual aids for instructional purposes and provides advisory services relating to their development and use; performs related duties as required.

#### **COMPLEXITY OF DUTIES**

Under general supervision, the duties of this position require creativity and technical knowledge.

## TYPICAL DUTIES

- 1. Confers with and advises teachers regarding types of visual aids to be used.
- 2. Designs and develops visual aids such as maps, charts, graphs, etc.
- 3. Makes transparencies from rough layouts.
- 4. Develops film strips.
- 5. Tapes radio broadcasts and television programs for presentation during school hours.
- 6. Makes tapes for use in language laboratory.
- 7. Records student special activities.
- 8. Sets up closed circuit TV camera, microscopes, bioscopes and other equipment.
